

### Year 3 Home Learning—Autumn 2

Our home-learning this half term is linked to our topic: Spain. You should aim to complete 3 challenges, at least, over the course of the half term. Please upload your homework to Google Classroom for marking.

Maths homework has been set for the alternate weeks.

<b>History</b>  The Moors ruled Spain for 800 years. Find out who they were and write a fact file of 5 facts.  The influence of the Moors can still be seen today in some Spanish buildings, especially where they are decorated with tiles. Draw a design in a Moorish style.	<b>Geography</b>  Research a location in Spain that you would like to visit.  Create a poster to attract visitors to go there.  Or  Can you design a Spanish geography word search?  What Spanish towns, regions, mountains and rivers could you include?	<b>Climate</b>  Research summer temperatures in Spain and some ways in which the Spanish adapt their lives to cope with them.  Design (draw a plan, or build a model of) a Spanish house with features that would help to keep its occupants cool. Take a photo of your design or model for Google classroom.
<b>Children's lives</b>  Find out about life as a child in Spain—what is school like?  Can you list 3 differences between school in Spain and school in the UK?	<b>Food and Cooking</b>  Cook a Spanish recipe and take a photo of it.  Sample your creation and give it a star rating; say what you did or didn't like about it.	<b>Wildlife</b>  Draw and label a Spanish animal—try to find one that we don't get in the UK.  Label it using scientific vocabulary and find out three facts about it.
<b>Language</b>  Speak like a native—learn how to say: 'My name is....' And 'I am ... years old' in Spanish.	<b>Art and architecture</b>  Find out about Antonio Gaudi, who had an influence on buildings in Barcelona, and write a fact file of 5 facts. Create a Gaudi-esque design.	<b>Sport and other pastimes</b>  What do the Spanish enjoy doing for leisure? Research to find out about Spanish sports or festivals and create a factfile.
